December meeting report – Annette Rose

The December meeting was our Christmas social evening and included a special thank you to our coordinators. But before that we welcomed two visitors from The Printworks who spoke to us for a few minutes each.

Ted Burke works on Plastics team.

He told us that he was last in Bromley 12 years ago when he was working on the Big Ask campaign. But now his role is to support local groups with the Plastics campaign. It is through local action that we can see the changes we want. Ted told us that so far 8 MPs have signed up to the plastics pollution action plan. He is pleased with this number as it is half of the number needed to make a bill and legislation viable.

The target is to have 20 MPs by the end of January 2019. Ted stressed how important the local groups are in reaching this target. He thanked our group for the work we have done on our campaigns. He is hopeful that next year there will be some good legislation which will enable plastics pollution to be tackled.

Stanley Knill, a volunteer from the clean air campaign also gave us an update. His role is to distribute air monitoring tubes and help produce online resources. He said that after 2 years of intense work the focus will now be on opposing fossil fuel use. It has been a successful year with 23 clean air zones being created across the country. Stanley mentioned the 'School Streets' campaign which aims to close streets around drop off and pick up times. A new extensive online guide will be available for clean air campaigners early in the New Year. It has been a little delayed due to technical difficulties.

Ann Garrett reported back on The Climate March. She expressed her disappointment with the low turnout and that the traffic had not been stopped for the march. There were some good speeches and rallies however. She feels that we need more young people to get on board and bigger numbers turning out.

Thank you to every-one who contributed food to the table. After some time chatting to our guests and enjoying the food the evening concluded with some poetry readings from Ann and Sheila. /continued on next page

Campaign Help Needed

write: Working as a group, we would like 2019 to be a year of action with locally-focussed campaigns. We would really like one or two more of our members to be actively working with us on plastics, nature, air pollution, climate and fracking. Do any of these campaigns interest you? Are there any other campaigns you feel we should work on?

For instance; we plan to work with shops and businesses in Bromley Town Centre to see if we can help them reduce their plastic consumption.

Climate, Energy and Transport – Ann Garrett

Climate Protests

On December 1st 2018 our Bromley FoE banner (see photo opposite) was taken to the UK Climate Change rally in Whitehall. This was the first of a series of international protests demanding action to stop disastrous global warming and to send a message to the Climate Change Conference in Poland. The march itself began at the Polish Embassy in Portland Place.

The rally saw campaigners hand in a letter to 10 Downing Street calling for Britain to ban the controversial and damaging energy extraction process of fracking.

Claire James from the Campaign Against Climate Change said in her speech ' It is vital that richer nations such as the UK, lead the way by doing what is the minimum required in this crisis - an urgent transition to a zero carbon economy. For example we need to reverse the ban on new onshore wind and invest in sustainable transport'.

Sian Berry, Green Party co- leader another speaker emphasised that ' we have just 12 years to limit climate catastrophe. Decisions made by global governments in Poland have the potential to make or break our ability to face the future'.

The Poland UN Climate Conference

David Attenborough at the actual conference in Katowice warned that ' inaction over climate change will lead to the collapse of civilisations and extinction of most of the natural world '. He said that ' action to cut emissions will cut air pollution deaths and generate millions of jobs and trillions of dollars'.

However, there has been a sense of pessimism from the talks which are still taking place while this is being written. There are concerns that the Paris declaration which is legally nonbinding could be used for propping up industries instead of investing in renewable energy sources.

The US, Saudi Arabia, Russia and Kuwait have declined to 'welcome' the Convention on Climate Change report, and only note its existence, which is light years away from finding a solution in terms of diplomat speak.

This lack of co-operation has been casting a cloud over the negotiations which are being held in a country committed to fossil fuel coal mining.

The point of the conference is to come up with a 'rule book' which will make real the Paris Agreement of 2015. Small countries at risk from climate change are very worried about the final outcome.

Apparently a deal has just been reached by the majority of countries on December 15th (*details to follow in the February newsletter*). Some campaigners don't think it has gone far enough, however.

Atomic Energy

The decision by Toshiba to pull out of building a new nuclear power station in Cumbria at Moorside has sent shock waves through the nuclear industry. This is emblematic of the problems of funding new nuclear power throughout the UK and in some other countries.

Ditching new nuclear would require a huge increase in the amount of wind and wave power. It would also need dramatic progress on energy storage, smarter grids and more efficient use of energy. This is something environmentalists have been saying for years!

Dockless Bike Scheme

Dockless 'park anywhere' electric bikes are coming to London in the first massmarket scheme of its kind, but at a price higher than the Boris bikes.

Lime which is backed by Uber and Google, have dropped the first e-bikes in Brent and Ealing. They can be unlocked for £1 and then cost 15p per minute. The bikes have power-assisted pedal motors and are fitted with alarms, tracker beacons and a 'smart lock'.

Bromley FoE objection to SHaW School Development Plan

Chief Planning Officer Bromley Civic Centre Stockwell Close BR1 3UH 30.11.18

Ref: The SHaW School Development Plan

Dear Planning Officer,

Bromley Friends of the Earth wish to object to the above plan on the following grounds

- The idea of siting a school in an already heavily congested traffic area is of great concern. There is evidence of extremely high levels of air pollution in the form of diesel particulate matter, nitrogen oxides and carbon monoxide emitted by vehicles and exacerbated by the vehicles stopping and starting at the traffic lights. These pollutants contribute to childhood asthma and it would surely be wrong to knowingly subject children to such high levels of air pollution.
- 2. At 10 storeys high , this development would have an overwhelming impact on nearby residents, and also obscure the view of Keston Ridge from the town centre area. The latter is a protected view. It would also be out of keeping with the desire of many local residents to retain as far as is possible the character of Bromley as a market town rather than a faceless suburb.
- 3. The outline design proposals are ugly and aesthetically unpleasing.
- 4. The plan has made no provision for onsite parking, and with the opening of the St Marks Square Centre, there would be even more congestion and pollution from traffic.
- 5. Impact on the local infrastructure is another major cause for concern.
- 6. It would be irresponsible to put young people in the high density development area of Bromley South.

Summary

Although we realise that another secondary school is badly needed, we think this site is most unsuitable, and recommend that the Council look for another, more environmentally conducive site as quickly as possible.

Possible future projects for Bromley FoE

Friends of the Earth contacted us during the year inviting us to enter into partnership with either or both of these two organisations which would involve us in recycling at a local level. Details below. We will discuss this at our AGM.

Recycling for Good Causes

You may have seen our partners Recycling for Good Causes at Basecamp this year – they collect unwanted items and recycle them to raise money for Friends of the Earth.

Sign up today and they'll send you a free sack for any items you've collected at stalls, group meetings, events, or just from friends and family. And when it's of an acceptable weight (10-30kg), just give them a call and they'll collect it free of charge at a convenient time for you. It's that simple and there's no long term commitment.

Here are the items they're able to get recycled:

Jewellery and watches – any material, even damaged or broken

Currency – any coins or banknotes, even if out of circulation

Mobile phones – even damaged or broken

Cameras - film, digital and video

Stamps – loose, single, albums, postcard collections, etc.

Electronics – sat-navs, MP3 players, game consoles, laptops, tablet computers, even damaged or broken.

About 8 weeks after items have been collected, Recycling for Good Causes will send a cheque to either your local group or national Friends of the Earth – the choice is yours!

The Restart Project

The Restart Project supports groups to run electronics repair events called Restart Parties. A Restart Party is a free community repair event where volunteers help people fix their own broken or slow electronic devices and small appliances. It saves them from waste and changes people's relationship with electronics. Restart Parties are also a great opportunity to recruit new members, mingle, and share in the fun of repair.

The Restart Project can support you to run your own event. They offer practical advice and guidance, help you find skilled volunteers locally and measure impact, allowing you to calculate the amount of e-waste diverted and CO2 emissions prevented.

Miller's Mutterings – Chris Miller

As you can imagine at this time of the year, the crops look after themselves. The wheat and barley are still growing, they are what we call tillering. This is, in effect, the plant making more stems to carry ears, and then next year depending on the amount of water and sunlight in the spring, the plant will kill off the ones it doesn't think it can feed. The cover crop is growing nicely.. The plants are sucking up any leftover nutrient from the previous crop.

The boys are still working converting the old farm shop into an office for me. The plastering has been done and painted and they are now working on the electrics. As you can imagine after all that practice in the old units, they are quite a dab hand at it now.

What a lot of rain and in such heavy downpours too. As I write this on the 27th November, we have had 120 mls (5") rain just this month. That is 110000 gallons of rain per acre!

Great Grandfather George writes in November 1915 they had snow and it was very cold. It took the steam engine 7 hours to get 2 waggons from Foxbury (where Foxbury Drive is now) to the main road but by the end of the month it was getting milder and the snow all gone.

The workers had harvested the potatoes and onions with the onions making £14 and the parsnips 90/- that morning at market. The weather wasn't good over the Christmas period and trade at the market very bad. They had 6" of rain during December so the fields must have been very wet indeed.

Steve's Grandfather and Great Uncle returned home from boarding school and their mother, Emily, who took them up to London with their sister Muriel, met George and they all went to visit Gamages.

Vickers of Erith were running buses to and from Orpington for the munition workers and were taking all the available houses to house them. Great Grandfather tenanted Harecroft house (now called Harefield) in Warren Road to Vickers for £50 per annum.

This month's weather report is from Devon in 1891. Apparently during a fierce blizzard, corn was reported to have germinated and grown to a height of 3ins beneath the snow – the ground was warm when the snow fell and the snow would have had an insulating effect against the cold air temperature above. Brrr brrr

FoE Campaign Updates

Clean Air - School Streets

As you know children are some of the most vulnerable to the effects of air pollution. That's why alongside our Clean Air Schools Pack we're keen to support local groups to campaign for School Streets where they live. This is when roads around the school are temporarily closed to vehicles on each school day, during set times at drop-off and pick-up.

It's an issue that has been gaining considerable momentum over the recent months and the evidence already shows that it reduces air pollution and boosts active travel at schools.

Pesticides

2018 has been great for bees - thank you for your continued campaigning to protect our precious pollinators. We're finishing the year on a high with the tougher ban on three bee-harming neonics coming into force and Somerset County Council becoming the latest council to have a pollinator plan. Huge well done to Glastonbury local group for their work on this!

We've been working hard to make the countryside even safer for bees and other wildlife by campaigning for a pesticide reduction target and working with farmers to show the government how it can be done. Three MPs have now put forward an amendment to the Agriculture Bill that would require the government to set a pesticide reduction target and use future farmer payments to help farmers cut chemical use. We're expecting the bill to be debated early next year and we'll be in touch about how you can get your MP involved.

In January, we'll also be handing in our petition demanding a pesticide reduction target - let's hope it'll be on the government's list of New Year resolutions. Have you added your name yet?

Fossil Free

Since fracking started in Lancashire two months ago, we've witnessed the threat that it poses to our natural environment.

There have now been over 35 earthquakes around the fracking site, and several of them have brought fracking to a halt. Earlier this week, the fracking company Cuadrilla was again forced to down tools after the largest earthquake since it started fracking in October.

Meanwhile, the government hasn't yet decided whether to go ahead with its reckless plans to fast-track fracking. Local communities across the country have told the government loud and clear to scrap the proposals.

On 2 February, we'll be hosting a gathering in London for people who are interested in the campaign to Let Communities Decide on fracking. And we'd like you to be a part of it. /continued on page 12 !!
